Next Mayors Conference to be held in Sapporo, Summer 2016

The World Winter Cities Association for Mayors (WWCAM) is a network which gathers winter cities from across the globe to learn from each other's technologies, experiences, and utilization of snow under the slogan, "Winter is a Resource and an Asset," convening member city mayors and representatives once every two years at the Mayors Conference.

While until now Mayors Conferences have traditionally been held during the winter, the upcoming 2016 Sapporo Mayors Conference will take place during the summer. Making use of Sapporo's delightful summer season, this conference aims to create an opportunity for sharing and learning about life beyond winter and broaden the scope of WWCAM activities.

This edition of World Winter City News will introduce upcoming Mayors Conference host city Sapporo and new member city Rovaniemi, as well as showcase the background of WWCAM.

Introducing Sapporo, host city of the 2016 Mayors Conference

While ranked Japan's fifth largest city with a population of 1.9 million, Sapporo is also blessed with abundant nature. In 1972 Sapporo was host to the first Winter Olympic Games ever held in Asia, which triggered its recognition as an international city of tourism.

Past Mayors Conferences

There have been a total of 16 Mayors Conferences held in Northern Europe, North America and Asia since the hosting of the first conference in Sapporo in 1982. While conferences had long been themed mainly on finding solutions to lifestyle challenges faced by winter cities, in recent years the focus of the conference has shifted to also include discussion on environmental themes gathering worldwide, regardless of community scale - and to promote member city efforts towards the resolution environmental conservation issues.

Since the Fourth Tromsø Mayors Conference in 1990, subcommittees have been established as bodies for government officials and technical experts to conduct the exchange, survey and research of specialized technologies and information.

Introducing new member city Rovaniemi



Rovaniemi is the Capital of Finnish Lapland and it is located on the Arctic Circle. The population of Rovaniemi is 61,000 and it's land area is 8017 km². Three percent of the population earns their living from primary production, 13 percent from processing and construction. The vast majority of more than 80 percent is employed by service sector.

Tourism has grown strongly in Rovaniemi region since the nineties. Approximately half a million tourists visit Rovaniemi each year. The unique location of Rovaniemi on the Arctic Circle has attracted visitors

from all over the world and almost 60 percent of the visitors come from abroad.

Rovaniemi and Lapland have a special status in the Arctic in transportation and logistics. The expertise provides a good opportunity to work in the future in the maintenance and repair activities, in particular as a center of operations for the Kola Peninsula and northern Norway directions. The companies in Rovaniemi are well placed to act as providers of services and products and special arctic know-how. This applies in particular to the area industrial companies, logistics companies and trade and tourism enterprises.

Rovaniemi offers the best conditions and arctic climate for testing cars tyres, studs and components in winter conditions. Rovaniemi has major cold testing cluster and constitutes a centre for arctic know-how. This is due not only to climatic factors but also to very deliberate work aiming to strengthen the position of Rovaniemi in the field of arctic knowledge.

Rovaniemi is the educational centre of Lapland and there are two universities located in Rovaniemi. The University of Lapland is the northernmost university in Finland and in the European Union. Lapland University for Applied Sciences has its home base in Rovaniemi.

In the Rovaniemi is located in a significant number of sector research institutes, whose expertise is available in the business. Arctic Centre from the University of Lapland is implementing diversity of an Arctic research, the demand will increase in the future.

As the official home town of Santa Claus, Rovaniemi celebrates Christmas every day of the year. Santa spends most of his time in Santa Claus Village, where you can meet him every day of the year. Guided trips to the Santa Claus Village can be taken in a car, reindeer or husky sleigh or snowmobile. Some excursions include the Arctic Circle Crossing Ceremony.
